


Why It's Good To Be A ZERO When You're Parenting

Mounting research suggests that alcohol causes more damage to the developing brains of teenagers than was previously thought, injuring them significantly more than it does adult brains.

Not only does drinking hurt the teen brain in the present, it can also damage the parts of the brain that are used for decision-making later in life.



What you need to know:

- More children are killed by alcohol than all illegal drugs combined.
- Children who begin drinking alcohol before the age of 15 are five times more likely than those who start after age 21 to develop alcohol problems later in life.
- If we can get our children through their teenage years without trying alcohol, the likelihood of them becoming addicted to alcohol goes down dramatically.

We recently held a contest at the Fountain Hills Middle School and asked students to create a poster that depicts how alcohol and drugs could effect one's life. Aly, our Prevention Award winner, is in the 7th grade and created the poster above. Aly couldn't have said it better:

"I researched what happens to your body when doing drugs. They talked about what happens to your brain. I wanted to show that when you do drugs you become depressed, sad and you don't have creative, happy thoughts. This is the opposite of someone who is drug-free. When you don't do drugs, people are happy to have you around. Being drug-free is very vital to your future. You'll feel better about yourself, you'll be happier and educated and ready to start your life".
