Rep. Kavanagh talks priorities

The next session of the Arizona State Legislature is set to open next week with a lot of issues on its plate including what is always a priority, the state budget.

Representative John Kavanagh, of Fountain Hills, said it is always a challenge to come up with the balanced budget as required by law. He said they are focused on beefing up the rainy day fund as a hedge against a possible recession.

Another budget-related subject the lawmakers will consider is an income tax conformity law. This would have the state filing requirements consistent with the federal government which would eliminate some tax deductions. Kavanagh clarified, however, that it would not change or impact the current tax credit system in the state, which allows taxpayers to take a dollar for dollar credit for donations to

charities. The amount is capped depending on single taxpayer or a couple.

The credits are relied on heavily by schools for extracurricular programs, food banks and similar charities. Kavanagh said they would not touch the credits.

Kavanagh said he is also working on legislation to address major problems with short-term rental properties. The current bill stripped

away too much control from local government to
