

Summer Show Alert – Does Watching 13 Reasons Why Increase Suicide? New Research Mixed

With teens and tweens home this summer, you can bet there will be some binge watching on You Tube, Netflix and Hulu.

One of those series they may be watching is 13 Reasons Why. The show is about a 17-yearold named Hannah who kills herself in a scene that shows her suicide. Following the show's release, researchers raised concerns about the possibility that it could lead to suicide contagion. They were concerned that showing self-harm could lead other people to commit suicide.

An, as of yet, unpublished study by Steven Stack at Wayne State University in Michigan and his colleagues gauged attention to the show on Twitter and analyzed US suicide rates in April and May 2017, the months with the most tweets.

For boys aged 10 to 19, they found an increase in suicide rate of 12.4 per cent, while in girls they saw a jump of 21.7 per cent compared with previous months. Stack says this research reflects the gender split expected for a show with a female lead character.

Daniel Romer at the University of Pennsylvania also conducted a study. He surveyed 729 people aged 18 to 29 before the second season aired to assess their vulnerability to risk of self-harm, and followed up with them a month after the show was released. He found that people who stopped watching partway through the season exhibited higher suicide risk and less optimism than those who watched the final episode.

But he also found that those who finished the series reported lower levels of suicide ideation and self-harm than people who didn't watch the show. That may be because it portrayed the protagonist's friend coping with life's challenges, says Romer.

Complicating this analysis is a general increase in suicide rates, of nearly 10 per cent, among 15 to 24 year olds during 2017. Seasonal effects may also be at play – studies have shown that suicide rates peak in the spring, though the reasons for this also aren't clear.

The bottomline for parents is to ask your kids, teens and tweens what they are watching and check their history.
